Introduction

Force under the direction of Hastings Trust, we were able to transcribe, collate and document all the monumental inscriptions carried on the gravestones discovered during the renovation of this neglected graveyard. Whilst this was not the first occasion the exercise had been conducted, it was deemed crucial to revise and expand the previous sketchy records. For the first time it combines the burial date and the inscriptions (many of which have not been recorded before), which will benefit genealogists and local historians alike. Within the book are numerous illustrations that will enlighten the reader whilst portraying details of the few remaining stones; all data and photographic material has been electronically archived and stored on a database which can be retrieved at one's leisure.

Historical Background

The provenance of St Mary-in-the-Castle has been documented many times but little has been published regarding the cemetery. It also has as unique a stance and fascinating history as that of the church and both should be praised with the respect and admiration deserved for such an invaluable resource. The cemetery of St Mary's Chapel, as it was once called, was consecrated for burial in 1828. The land was acquired by Thomas Pelham, 2nd Earl of Chichester, for the purpose in unison with the estate to erect his proprietary chapel, now of course, St Mary-in-the-Castle. During the first quarter of the nineteenth century this ancient parish had been without a chapel for worship, many resorting to congregate and worship at the ancient chapel ruins within the castle grounds for services. The churches of All Saint's and St Clements were frequented but the graveyards couldn't meet the needs of an expanding populace; this was worsened by the absence of a perpetual curate of St Mary's. The patron, procrastinating, couldn't afford this privilege, neglected his duties and disenfranchised his parishioners from their rightful place of worship. To worsen matters the Earl had erected a perimeter fence enclosing the castle grounds in preparation for the cutting back of the cliff face to facilitate the construction of Pelham Crescent, and of course St Mary's Chapel. The announcement of a new church along with a cemetery could not happen sooner and in 1825 the foundations were laid to resurrect this ancient parish. The honourable Earl died soon after but his son and heir Henry Thomas, the 3rd Earl of Chichester, became patron and appointed the first perpetual curate, a Reverend William Wallinger, henceforth the parish was re-established.

Many of the early burials were in the crypt or catacombs underneath the chapel but space was limited and only provided for wealthy and eminent persons. The majority of people were interred at the cemetery, now known as Wallinger's Walk graveyard. Funeral services were conducted from a sacristy or mortuary chapel on the site and provision was made for the overnight containment of coffins; this was policed by night watchman to deter grave robbers or 'Resurrection Men' from their sacrilegious deeds. The rear wall of the chapel displayed memorial plaques carved in marble and slate in memoriam to a few worthies. The boundary walls were constructed of fine quality sandstone and the entire site was alphabetically grid referenced by engraving characters onto the facing stone running parallel to each other; a unique feature of the cemetery. In 1854 the cemetery, along with others in the town was ordered to close by the Secretary of State. The Metropolitan Interments Act 1850 was repealed in 1852, which became known as the Burial Act, sought to pass the control of burials from parishes to local authorities and the establishment of public cemeteries. It was to take a further four years before the birth of the public cemetery in Hastings.

As a cemetery St Mary's was never full to capacity, this was due to seats being purchased or subscribed to in the chapel; only a few hundred from a capacity of twelve hundred accommodated parishioners, the majority occupied by well-heeled aristocrats and wealthy tourists. This is consistent with the social class of the persons interred at the cemetery, only a minority of native parishioners affording marked graves. In fact the presence of so many gentry, clergy and nobility personifies the fashion of the age and illustrates the social and economic changes that shaped Hastings and tourism as an expanding industry. The graveyard was now redundant, burials were only continued for those few who had purchased family plots. In 1894 the burial ground became a nuisance for the modernising environment in the vicinity; the Castledown Estate, being erected around its perimeters, deprived the cemetery of its once pleasant openness and exclusiveness. The necessity to improve roads and carriage ways was to culminate in the Milward Road Widening Scheme: a portion of the graveyard, along with the boundary wall was destroyed and re-built to different dimensions, numerous graves were interred elsewhere on site and only an incompetent record remains of the transcriptions undertaken.

The twentieth century was a downward spiral for this once cherished ground. The two World Wars and the dramatic social changes that ensued influenced the manner in which we thought about the dead. Cremation was now the preferred option and ostentatious monuments not permitted, it became increasingly difficult to justify spending money on the dead. The mortuary chapel suffered damage during the numerous air raids throughout the war and was subsequently demolished in the 1950's. The next two decades brought further doom and gloom, parish councils could ill afford to maintain these redundant sites and were confronted with the dilemma as to the how future preservation could be secured. This would culminate in an act of parliament that allowed churches to offer the land to local authorities thus relinquishing the financial burden of maintenance.


In 1979 a scheme was authorised to create a landscape garden, this proved to be an ill-fated affair — the catalyst for irreparable damage. All but a few gravestones were destroyed and covered with soil and turf; this was deemed to be the best solution to alleviate the difficulty in grass cutting. Despite the legal requirement many inscriptions were unrecorded and either destroyed or buried, those that remained became vandalised, stolen and lost beneath the entangled scrubland that was soon to undermine the site. The chapel of St Maryin-the-Castle was now dilapidated and the future looked bleak for both. It wasn't until the late 1980's that a scheme to salvage and transform the gravevard into a Wildlife Garden and an environmental resource enhanced its prospects. This led to the inauguration of a local amenity society that constituted measures to protect and reverse the decline, instigate plans for improvement and address the need to exploit the provenance and real potential of the site as a public asset. However, notwithstanding the genuine passion and commitment from a strictly voluntary undertaking with little financial support the site inevitably could not be sustained and fell into decline once again. Simultaneous measures were instigated to save St Mary's and a society was formed that prompted extensive repairs leading to the restoration and transformation of the chapel into an arts centre. It is now a successful and profitable establishment that the town can be proud of. It wasn't until 1999, when a package of improvements was instigated by a consortium of people and organisations, that a successful partnership was formed. This aimed to regenerate the cemetery as a public memorial garden that could be sustained and enjoyed by future generations.

As I draw to a conclusion to this brief history

there are still ongoing improvements being undertaken and will be for the foreseeable future.

I praise everyone who has participated in this project; their indefatigable efforts have given a new lease of life to this delightful little spot and it is a fitting tribute to the many unsung heroes and dignitaries buried deep within the hallowed soil.




The bottom of the headstone has an inscription 'Burchell Hastings'. This is probably the stone mason or undertakers that were contracted.

This is the Wallinger family vault, upon the death and interment of the Reverend William Wallinger, the grave was sealed. The monumental inscriptions are engraved upon a large ledger of York sandstone which is surrounded by a kerb originally erected to house a cast iron palisade (removed during WW2). The entire fabric of the grave has been undermined by self-sown sycamore trees that were allowed to establish a foot hold within the vicinity. Although this matter was urgently addressed and measures initiated to prevent further damage the tomb remains in a fragile state. It is intended that renovations to the tomb can only be undertaken once the structural condition of the boundary wall is improved; due to this risk the area is enclosed by a safety fence that prohibits casual access.



Appendix i

On August 29th 1894 a faculty or planning permission was acquired by Hastings Corporation for road widening at Milward Road affecting the existing boundaries of the grave yard. The relevant section is reproduced below. Eleven graves were destroyed and the remains re-interred elsewhere. The inscriptions were first transcribed. The relocation and re-interment were advertised within the local and national press, as was required by law, to allow relatives of the deceased to raise any objections.


...the ancient burial ground of the said parish which has been long disused by order of a Secretary of State is enclosed by a wall the south west corner of which abuts and forms an inconvenient angle with the road called Milward Road that the corporation of Hastings recently acquired at large cost an extensive piece of land in the West Hill have appropriated the same as a Recreation Ground for the inhabitants and an adjoining estate lying to the north of the Burial Ground, has been converted into building land and a large number of residences have been erected thereon, that the said road which leads directly to the West Hill and the said estate has

thus become an important thoroughfare and that the before mentioned angle of the Burial Ground is not only of inconvenience but of danger to the increased traffic, that with a view of remedying the difficulty and providing additional facilities of access to the Parish Church especially for invalid parishioners it is proposed at the expense in all things of the Corporation to throw into the road so much of the Burial Ground as is coloured pink on the plan drawn hereon and to rebuild the enclosure wall on the same line coloured blue on the said plan. That there are within the space coloured pink eleven Burials and no more of which the particulars are set forth in the schedule hereto and the petitioner's having prayed that a faculty may issue authorising the proposed work our said Commissary rightly and duly proceeding did after the usual citation and no more appearing in opposition to the granting of the faculty prayed and after the examination on oath of all witnesses in open court held in the church aforesaid on the thirteenth day of August one thousand eight hundred and ninety four .


...grant our license or faculty to the said petitioners to authorise and empower them for the purpose of the widening of Milward Road in the manner proposed in the said petition to take down the present boundary wall of the said Burial Ground which abuts on Milward Road and to throw into the said Road the portion of the said Burial Ground coloured pink as aforesaid with a view to the same being used as part of the said public road so long as it may be required for that purpose...

Provided Always that the removal and re-interment of the human remains disturbed be reverently conducted under the superintendence of the vicar and churchwarden and in accordance with any special sanitary requirements given by the Urban Sanitary Authority of the Borough in reference to the removal of such Remains.


Original faculty manuscript showing the proposed alterations to the graveyard

An example of a grave depicting the entire memorial as assembled with headstone, central sarcophagus or barrel shaped tomb and footstone. It is common for the epitaph to be engraved on the headstone but additional inscriptions are often discovered upon the central tomb; these are generally less distinguishable due to the effects of weathering and the awkward orientation of the stone.



This illustrates an incomplete marble memorial plaque originally on the rear wall of the sacristy or mortuary chapel within the graveyard. These fragments were discovered whilst clearing rubble from the site and along with others were photographed, transcribed collected together and re-interred.

A faculty to demolish the chapel was granted in 1954 due to its derelict and dangerous condition. There is evidence to suggest bomb damage during WW2 was the cause of the subsequent ill fate of the building. I have consulted the faculty and the relevant section states:


There are fourteen marble tablets on the inside wall facing the dilapidated door but if the building is demolished this wall could remain and form part of the stone boundary wall surrounding the Burial Ground. The tablets would remain untouched and undisturbed and could be on the inside of the boundary wall

A later inspection found all the plaques missing and the wall painted. These were destroyed, stolen or lost within the rubble that remained in situ. These fragments may be all that remains to commemorate the fourteen persons who are buried within the graveyard. This is fine example of an enclosed tomb at St Clements churchyard in the Old Town, Hastings.


The iron pailings indicate a neoclassical architectural style and serve to protect whilst lending height and ornament to an otherwise bold, modest structure. It is rare to see in situ with so many destroyed during WW2.

During the course of our work at Wallinger's Walk we found iron finials identical to those illustrated; these have been stored so that a cast can be made at a later date to assist in the restoration of the Wallinger family tomb.






Depicting memorial stones salvaged and re-erected along the boundary wall.




These stones are situated along the boundary at Wallinger's Walk. The boundary wall was rebuilt in the 1980's, the infill with railings was designed to allow additional vision, light and security to the site.



This depicts a fine pair of tombs at All Saint's churchyard, Old Town, Hastings. This type was frequently employed for family burials; the four sides accommodating numerous epitaphs.
