Community Chest



The Government has recognised the importance of community-based regeneration and wishes to support local groups by providing financial assistance for projects and activities. Community Chest funding is intended to benefit community groups and small voluntary organisations working at a very local level.

Hastings Trust has been asked to administer the funds and undertake outreach work to ensure the widest possible spread of the money within Hastings' communities.

Hastings Trust's new
Community Regeneration Unit
(CRU) has been administering
the Community Chest during
2002. In this time, the CRU
has supported 42
organisations to access 44
grants totalling £145,090
(average grant of £3,300).

Projects as varied as:


- activities for people with disabilities
- events to promote cultural identity and integration
- renovations to community facilities to bring them up to standard
- community arts and music projects that residents have identified
- support groups
- newsletters and publicity materials
- training

These 44 projects have supported young people, ethnic minority groups, women's groups, residents associations, parents and young children, older people, support groups for disadvantaged communities, faith-based community

projects, all who are resident and/or working in Hastings and St Leonards.

The Community Chest will currently run for another year (April 2003 to March 2004). We have £100,000 to be given away to community based projects next year. You can bid for £50 to £5,000.

With spring approaching, groups such as play schemes and over 50's clubs were requesting help with applications for funding for outings and new courses such as craft, swimming, aromatherapy and reflexology.

Oasis is pleased to welcome residents to regular quiz nights that are held to raise funds for activities and to test your knowledge at a cost of £2 each and are held at Halton Heights lounge.

The over 50's in the Ore Valley can now also benefit from a new audio tape library that is available at Oasis (46 - 48 Chiltern Drive) Mon - Fri and at Halton Heights (Priory Road) Mondays 11 am - Ipm at a cost of £1 a week, of which 50p is returned to the resident when the tape is returned.

For the last two months, the Befriending Scheme pilot

project has been delivering a new service to the residents of the Ore Valley, with clients self referring or being recommended by other residents who recognised a need that the Befriending service can meet. The organiser has been requested to hang curtains, run small errands to the shops, make phone calls on behalf of residents and be company for half an hour over a cup of tea - services that are often missed in these busy times.

Oasis is setting up six-week multi-cultural sessions for young people in the Ore Valley, to be followed by six weeks of young people developing new cooking skills learned from the older residents of the Ore Valley who have a lot of precious knowledge to impart.

For the convenience of Ore valley residents, The Credit Union holds sessions at Oasis

on Thursday lunchtimes. Tomorrow's People are available all day Fridays for support finding a job, creating CV's and looking at your skills if you would like to change career. Tuesdays finds the ADHD (Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder) support group which welcomes all parents / carers who need a little extra help and information on on this condition - Isabel is on hand with a variety of books, videos and her knowledge every week in term time.

Community Regeneration Unit

Working with and for the community

Hastings Trust has been successful in securing four year funding for a new, innovative, exciting and dynamic community regeneration project. Single Regeneration Budget Round 6 and European (ERDF) Objective 2 money has been used to create a Community Regeneration Unit (CRU). Over the last six months, new staff have been appointed to take on community economic development projects with local residents to set up community businesses, cooperatives and social enterprises. To increase their participation and sense of belonging to the community

of Central St Leonards CRU staff are also working with the following target groups: older people, BME (Black, Minority and Ethnic) communities, residents moving into employment and asylum seekers and refugees. Since starting work the CRU team has supported 42 organisations securing Community Chest grants totalling £145,090, and a range of other funding (see the front page). The CRU has also undertaken research, mapping and the establishment of new operating systems for the CRU including a community facilities database. The CRU was housed in temporary offices at 35 Robertson Street during renovation work by

Trust Contracts Ltd to the 2nd and 3rd floor of 34 Robertson Street. This work was completed in the first week of March. As well as new offices there is training and meeting space. The CRU held its official launch for Board Directors and key agencies across the Borough in April.

Money for Social Entrepreneurs

UnLtd's millennium award scheme provides cash awards and support for social entrepreneurs to enable them to grow and develop their projects. UnLtd wants to support people who have the ideas and commitment to make a really positive change. This could be someone who either wants to start up a community project or a social enterprise. At Level 1 we offer,

on average, £2000 to help make people's idea a reality. As well as a cash award we will offer advice, training, mentoring and other support services for our award winners. Level 1 awards are available now.

Over the next few months our Level 2 awards will offer £10,000 to individuals plus a menu of support. We are also

developing a third level called UnLtd Ventures which will provide more intensive support for fully developed projects

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Enhancement Team Update




As 2003 began, we wasted little time and ploughed headlong into unfinished business at Stonefield Road (pictured above left). The embankment presented us with many challenges; the steep sloping terrain and poor accessibility exacerbated by the plummeting temperature promised to hamper our efforts but we prevailed. In time, dreary walls will be clothed with ivy, the backdrop to vibrant evergreen shrubs. The new improved entrance cut into the bank creates a level and safe gateway for maintenance. A stone's throw away you will notice something fixed to the wall at Wallinger's Walk. A plaque recalls the history of the Castledown Estate emblazoned with a 'bird's eye' view plan.

Contrary to opinion, we do focus our attention elsewhere

in the town. Westward to St Leonards lies the church of St Mary Magdalen, a fabulous mid Victorian edifice and home to the Greek Orthodox faith. A partnership initiated by Hastings Trust seeks to revitalise the unkempt churchyard and safeguard a thriving future. Work has started to clear the masses of litter and rubbish entangled amongst the thorny brier that encompasses the site. Utmost praise is due to my industrious volunteers; their unfaltering commitment has been exemplary.

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
Resource Centre

The seven months from July 2002 to January 2003 saw 4496 recorded visits to the Resource Centre. Our range of services included basic IT training, internet access, business advice, career development, marketing and funding help (both for individuals and groups) and meeting room provision.

The Centre has contributed to community capacity building through partnerships with a variety of groups helping local regeneration, including management consultants, accountants, BME (Black, Minority and Ethnic groups) groups, drug and alcohol rehabilitation organisations and internet access providers. The Centre will be giving those who want to develop their career the opportunity to obtain interest-free educational loans with funds provided by SEEDA. With **HCAT** (Hastings College of Arts & Technology) the Centre is providing premises for courses in Basic English. The Centre is now also a town centre access point for the Credit Union.

The Hastings Trust Resource Centre has played an active role in the development of IT Learning and Internet Services across the whole spectrum of community from its earliest participation in the Hastings Library

discussions through to research and development of independent commercial Internet Kiosks such as Mahavis and the latest Internet Junction (in Queens Road) and the ongoing support for Southwater project's IT services.

Funding guidance and especially use of the Funder Finder database, that eases searching for funding for community groups, continues to be regularly requested, as are the services of the new Community Regeneration Unit, which has greatly expanded the help we can give.

Interest in Personal
Development (including
positive CV creation) is
showing signs of an increase

and is currently part of the Volunteer induction programme to ensure adequate support is provided for their long-term career/employment prospects. This concept has also been taken up as a possible separate project funding opportunity by those interested in BME.

We would like to once again express our thanks to all the volunteers and especially Lyndon Potter who has just joined Marshall Tufflex in their Customer Care Department, after many months of great work for the Centre - we wish him every success.
