To promote and support local economic development we:



Director's Report

This review highlights what the Trust has achieved over the past 12 months. It gives you a glimpse of the range of the Trust's team. The ingenuity, drive and dedication of our Board, staff and volunteers in delivering our aims and objectives has been extraordinary. But, looking back, I think that for me, 2005- 6 was the year of the Elastic Overdraft.

The upside: this was the result of a number of successful bids coming on line with very tight deadlines for spending. The downside: the payments for them came so much later than promised. This could have caused sleepless nights but thanks to our commercial bankers, Barclays, we were able to support the projects to delivery by virtue of our working cash-flow overdraft. Without it, the Trust could not have delivered its services, nor supported our communities to the breadth and depth we expect to.

The necessity of a viable physical asset base for longterm sustainability is vital, not just for the Trust, but for our local communities. This is why so much effort went into supporting the development and delivery of The Bridge for the community in Farley Bank and Halton.

Because we believe that communities should own and control their own assets, the Trust is working with the

Development Trusts Association nationally for recognition and support for Community Anchor Organisations. Watch this space.

The Chairman's Report

In a year of constant activity, the Trust's major achievement has undoubtedly been the building and opening of The Bridge community centre in Ore. Finished ahead of time, it was attracting local users from the day it opened. If you haven't been there yet, do go – the café alone is worth a visit, for high quality, locally sourced and intelligently planned food at good value.

This project, significantly larger than any we have undertaken up to now, illustrates perfectly why the town needs an organisation like the Trust. Our independence, experience and track record all play a part. We were asked to develop the previous dilapidated building for the community, and that is what we did, appointing James Leathers as the community worker to ensure that the new building became a living and breathing place, and not just a showpiece. The successful conclusion of the project was due in no small part to the enormous

amount of time put in by Christine Goldschmidt and James Leathers while construction was under way.

The Trust's dependence for the most part upon external sources of funding, made us constantly aware of the impact of regulation on staff time and Trust costs. The government claims to be addressing the burden of regulation, yet this year the Trust's annual audit costs will increase by some 40% as a result of new regulations, and government funding runs – typically – six months in arrears. It's not an easy environment...

But we continue to work to our strengths: the skill, experience and commitment of our long-term staff and volunteers. It's the people that make the Trust, and we have enormous admiration for them.

The Hastings Trust Resource Centre

The year saw SRB funding ending, Chris King the Centre Manager's departure and much discussion about the Centre's future.

Chris King

Chris King came from a commercial background in marketing and finance and brought skills to the Trust often lacking in the voluntary sector. Chris was a great motivator inspiring both volunteers and clients alike. In his last year he advised 51 clients in marketing, business and career development, personal development and other areas. Working for the Hastings Trust, he said, had been a very positive piece of personal development and the opportunity to put back into the community a little of what he'd gained. Now, in partnership with the Trust, Chris is looking at using his life coaching expertise to train, motivate and enthuse leaders of BME groups,

trainers of all kinds, those facing unemployment and anybody else seeking to improve their confidence in dealing with complexity of modern life.

The Centre and its future

The essential work of advising individuals continued. Chris King and Heather Smith (see Adult Learning, Volunteering & Workforce Development) offered in depth services while the volunteers, especially Malvin Cane, gave their own indispensable, much demanded and appreciated one to one support with emails, CV writing, information and more. The Centre hosted a book launch by local historian Sue King, an exhibition of James Rose's photographs and paintings by Maureen Connett.

However, with visit numbers of casual users declining, plans are now in hand to update the antique technology, lower prices, improve layout, take better advantage of Centre's town centre location with special offers to voluntary organisations, artists and students. Expect good news next Review.

The Green Team Spring into Action

One year old we are, but we have employed all the wisdom gained from many years of previous project work. On reflection, we have achieved quite a lot considering our limited resources and stirred a great deal of interest along the way. We continued to care for the churchyard of St. Mary Magdalen and took delight in watching its growth. We observed ornamental shrubs flourish and mingle with wild flora attracting insects to nectar rich flowers. It is a joy to see the site evolve and mature as we follow its development with minimal intervention. I believe we have struck a balance between nature conservation and the severe gardening techniques of the past. This is exemplified in our wildflower meadow where we have resisted mowing to allow wild plants to thrive. Existing habitats have been

preserved and space given for others to emerge.

This is critical to increasing biodiversity and will be the mainstay of our present and future endeavours. So doing less can achieve more when we apply a discerning approach to the environment.

Nigel Harvey, a friend and long-standing devotee of Hastings Trust has found employment marking the end of a decade's volunteering. Nigel has been dubbed the Trust's 'Artist in Residence' and has played an active role in promoting our goals whilst expressing on canvas his passion for the environment. We are confident he will flourish in his appointment as Assistant Curator of the Queen's Royal Irish Hussars Museum at Eastbourne.

Community Regeneration Unit

2005/6 marked the fourth year of the Community Regeneration Unit (CRU), delivering services to target communities in Hastings and St Leonards.

Innovative Finance, the Community Development Finance Initiative, was



officially launched in October 2005 by local MP Michael Foster. Loans of up to £2,000 are available for community groups and social enterprises. Innovative Finance is just one of the services the CRU provides to community groups and budding social enterprises, please contact us for details of the full range of support the CRU offers.

August saw the third two-day Multi-Cultural Five-a-Side Football Tournament. It was third time lucky for Kurdistan United whose improved performance snatched them the Cup, with Player of the Tournament going to Kyle

Munhawa from Ekota Seniors. Many thanks to Ade and Sam from Hastings United F.C. for presenting the trophies.

In partnership with Pulse and Youth Development Service, the weekly asylum seeker/ refugee drop-In continued to develop, with workshops in computer music making from Sound Architect and the development of a community African Drumming group (Meli Melo). Meli Melo took part in many community and charity events throughout the summer.

The CRU funded the second OCN-Accredited Community Interpreting Course (delivered by Diversity Resource International): more than a dozen students received their certificates from the Mayor at a celebration at the White Rock Theatre and can now offer vital interpreting skills in languages including Arabic, Armenian, Cantonese and Polish.

March 2006 saw the end of the Small Grants Programme (Community Chest/Learning Chests) which provided a really useful source of small scale funding to a lot of local groups. 61 Community Chest grants were made, totaling £138,656.26 and 15 Community Learning Chest grants were made, totaling £26,350.90.

Community Resource Centre in the heart of St. Leonards-On-Sea

The Centre continued to be very busy, and the figures show that 8,113 people and children came through the centre doors last year, over 1,000 up on the previous year. All busy playing, attending courses, training or taking part in meetings, finding work, and the many other services on offer.

The year ended with a very successful and well attended 'Open Day' at the Centre on the 24th March. The list of names who had stalls giving advice and information indicates the range and involvement of Silchester Mews with the local community over the year: Community Regeneration Unit, Sure Start, Community Fruit and Veg Project, Pulse, Employment Opportunities, Jace Training, Kamm (Kids and Moslem Mums), Tuesday Social Club, Hastings Trust, Gensing and St Leonards Forum, Women in Action, UK Online, and Tomorrow's People.

Helena Wojtczak, local authoress and historian, opened the event with a very interesting talk on the two Blue Plaques in Silchester Road.

A big thank you to Sue, the centre assistant and our two volunteers, Yvonne and Jason, for all their help, support and effort over the year.

Oasis

The last year has been a particularly eventful one for Oasis. In May 2005 we sent our carefully written bid to the Big Lottery asking for funds to employ a full time worker for the Oasis Befriending Scheme, keeping fingers crossed all the way to the Post Office. June saw the Oasis ESOL (English for Speakers of Other Languages) group enjoy a sunny day out at Drusilla's animal park. As many of the students had taken their exams at Hastings College only a few days before, the day out provided a much needed break from their studies.

August means school holidays and Playscheme, and last year Broomgrove Playscheme visited Monkey World in Dorset, Legoland and Southend, while many of our over 50's enjoyed pub lunches and Hop Farms of Kent.

During the hot summer days staff and volunteers, under the gentle blowing of the fans, were busy packing away all the equipment as our office in the Surestart building was to be part of the redevelopment to turn part of the building into a children's centre. The building work was to take one year so finding new premises was the priority.

Wishing to remain within the Broomgrove Community, we rented a shop in the parade of shops in Malvern Way, which we would turn into an office. Although it has been a slow process, our planning permission went through. Some building work has started and we are keen to be in the new premises soon. We have been fortunate in that two local building firms have generously offered to help in our task of refurbishment, and look forward to a grand opening day in the next couple of months.

In October 2005 we arranged a trip to Blackpool, taking 53 people including children, parents and over 50's. We visited the tower and drove the mile of colourful lights. By the beginning of March 2006 we heard that we had been successful in our lottery bid, and our new full time Befriending Scheme Project Worker will start shortly.

Southwater Area Community Centre

The Community Centre saw an upsurge in business since taking on No 2 Stainsby Street, which used to be home to the Neighbourhood Renewal Unit (HBC). All offices were rented out and the Centre's administrative support is based there.

The Centre itself was busy all year and the Co-ordinator and Manager developed a programme of activities in response to feedback from users. As well as regular bookings from groups such as Club 4 Kids, Kings Church and 1066 Healers, the Centre's programme of activities included:

A thriving Gardening Group which meets once a month, with regular plant sales and visits to local gardens.

A Reading Group/Book Club developed from ideas brought to the Centre by the local community.

Monthly Story telling sessions in the Centre - with volunteers reading stories, organising activities and inviting children and parents to join a relaxation session.

The Centre also supported local services for the community, including the Community Fruit and Veg Project stall every Wednesday and the Hastings and St Leonards Credit Union every Thursday.

The Centre is always looking to recruit members of the local community to the committee, which meets once a month to steer the Centre. The Centre also now has a really enthusiastic group of volunteers who are involved in all aspects of the Centre and there is always scope for more volunteer involvement.

Adult Learning, Volunteering & Skills Development


Volunteers

Key to the functioning of the Trust were front line reception volunteers who provided a vital link between service users, our partners and staff.

Graphic design, desk top publishing fundraising, social research, landscaping were just some of the specialist tasks undertaken.

The Bridge Finish one job, create 10 more...

The Bridge building is completed and in January 2006 the community's 5 year campaign came to fruition when The Bridge opened its doors. From the first day the building has been well used, seeing over 300 visits a week.

Centred around a café that promotes healthy eating and uses local produce, The Bridge has attracted people from a wide range of the community. For young people there is a youth club and after school clubs, while the art and history groups have proved popular with the older members of our community. We have had up to 9 courses running in a week and each of these has free crèche facilities.

So besides the crèche staff, the youth workers, the tutors, the play staff, The Bridge has created seven new jobs, five volunteers and eight new trustees. We hope that another seven new jobs are on the way.

Hastings Trust will hand these assets, lock stock and barrel, over to The Bridge Community Enterprise Ltd, the best vehicle to ensure that The Bridge is used for the purpose it was designed for and will be for decades to

come. Until other agencies have similar faith in community activists, Hastings Trust will have to lead the way in community development.



Basis of opinion: We have carried out the procedures we consider necessary to ascertain whether the summarised financial statements are consistent with the full financial statements from which they have been prepared.


