Director's news

New Finance Initiative

The Trust is part of an innovative project which brings together existing partners in Hastings and Bexhill to form a Community Banking Partnership (CBP). This is a new initiative to establish a gateway to existing service agencies, adding the loan service of the Trust's cdfi - Innovative Finance - together with the Credit Union, plus debt advice and access to financial literacy training from CAB and others. The CBP will also act as a conduit to assist people to open basic bank accounts and credit union accounts, with the intention of promoting full financial inclusion and literacy for

We have secured SRB funding for the initial set up and are part of the successful Hastings' Local Growth Initiative Bid for further funding support. The Trust has also put in a bid with South Coast Money Line to the Department of Work and Pensions for funding from their Growth Fund to expand Innovative Finance, our own community development finance institution

Skills2Build

Skills 2 Build is a new project that will provide training and employment in construction, to NVQ level 2, for mainly young residents of deprived wards in Hastings. This will be achieved through a social enterprise that will buy, renovate and sell residential properties starting in Central St. Leonards Housing Renewal Area. Trading surpluses will be recycled back into the enterprise, allowing growth and sustainability.

S2B has been developed by a partnership led by Hastings Trust, comprising Ore Valley Residents Services Organisation (OVRSO), Amicus Horizon, 1066 Housing Association, Hastings College of Art and Technology (HCAT), Hastings Borough Council, and Rother Homes. The group has been advised by The Construction Industry Training Board (CITB), and the Learning and Skills Council (LSC), Westridge Construction and George Stone Construction.

We are waiting for SEEDA approval of funding, having already secured funding support from ERDF Objective 2.

One phase ends

Resource Centre SRB funding ended on March 31st. Chris King, the Centre's dynamic manager, has left after eight and a half years for a period of rest before launching himself into new challenges.

A vanguard operation when it opened in 1998, the Centre was visited by communities from all over the country and even overseas. Its services included help in finding grants for groups and individuals and the first publicly available broadband access in Hastings. Despite competition from increasingly faster and cheaper internet technologies, the Centre maintained its casual visitor numbers at a high level but numbers began to fall off in 2004.

In contrast, tailored advice to clients from Heather Smith and Chris King actually increased, and such help was an original and primary purpose of the

Centre. But now with Chris's farewell what next?

Another phase begins

After much discussion amongst the Board, staff and volunteers the decision has been made to test a number of possibilities including promoting the Centre as a means for voluntary sector organisations to establish a Town Centre presence (see the front page). Other complementary possibilities include greater use of the Centre as an exhibition space for local artists, photographers, students and voluntary work.

The Centre's equipment is out of date. We have some ideas about what equipment would best serve our clients but to help us make sure the Centre is meeting a genuine need please fill in the questionnaire enclosed with this Newsletter. You could win a bottle of champagne!

OASIS

We are pleased that our plans for a new venue for Oasis are coming together. With the funds and pledges raised, we can start on turning the old taxi office into a new community facility for the Ore Valley.

Our groups have been very patient during our period of change: the craft group has been continuing to produce wonderful cards, knitted scarves and seasonal gifts from their homes, the Over 50's club has attended several outings and the ESOL (English for Speakers of Other Languages) classes have been meeting at Broomgrove Community Centre three times a week. They are all very excited about meeting at the new centre which will have a reception area, meeting space, offices, a kitchen, disabled toilet and crèche area.

Oasis continues to support Broomgrove Playscheme, which has organised outings this Easter to Glynde Gap Bowling Centre, Madame Tussauds and the Imperial War Museum. There are also theatre trips to see Spirit of the Dance, Saturday Night Fever and Starlight Express, and there are still a few places left for residents who wish to attend from the Ore valley. Plans are being drawn up for summer outings with Legoland and Southend being top of everyone's favourites list.

Lottery success

We are very pleased to announce at Oasis that our application to the lottery for the Oasis Befriending Scheme was successful. We were awarded £96,000 to extend provision of the Befriending Scheme, employing a full time worker for three years. This exciting news means that we will be able to increase the delivery of the Befriending Scheme to even more residents within the Ore Valley community.




Funding



Volunteer beginning work

Winter can be the most uninspiring period of the gardening year so to muster enthusiasm amid the dullest coldest season is testing for the best of us. However, it is ideally suited for taking stock and charting our progress from one year to the next.

No matter what the season is St Mary Magdalen church needs care and attention both indoors and out and there is always work to do. During a routine check of the belfry we found several louvres teetering on the brink of falling to the garden below and had to take swift action to remedy the situation. Each piece of slate was fastened with rope, delicately removed and

lowered to safety. Replacements have been made in plywood as a temporary measure to keep rain and pigeons out until enough funds are raised for the extensive repair of the tower. Our endeavours were extended to re-adjusting the wheel and striking hammer of the bell. This was perhaps our most rewarding achievement since the dulcet chime may once more summon people to church. It raised some eyebrows from disconcerted passers-by as well!

Come spring we hope to plant more shrubs. Species such as Berberis produce an abundance of berries during winter thus attracting birds and foraging animals to an invaluable source of food. We selected contrasting styles of foliage to complement multifarious growth habits that give

texture and shape. The introduction of indigenous species to the wild flower meadow will increase biodiversity as well as exhibiting our naturalistic approach to gardening.

As always, this work would not have been possible without the help of volunteers.

community regeneration unit

The CRU continues to provide support to their target communities: older people, asylum seekers and refugees, people interested in starting social enterprises and BME communities.

Innovative Finance is a loans scheme aimed at community/voluntary groups and social enterprises who cannot access more mainstream funding. Anyone interested in Innovative Finance should call William.

The asylum seeker and refugee drop-in had a break over this period. We welcomed new members of the community from Monday 24th April at the WRVS Isabel Blackman Centre.

We are carrying out research which aims to tell the real story behind people's reasons for applying for asylum in the UK, to present information in a positive way, showing the different conditions in their home countries and the background to their cases. If you know anyone who would be willing to share their story, please contact us on the number below.

The CRU piloted an innovative work placement scheme for refugees. The placement is a paid position and works on a rolling programme of 13 weeks, where refugees who may not have work experience in the UK can gain valuable skills and experience to enable them to be more confident

when applying for jobs.

The community interpreting and translation course was such a success that we ran it again! The course provides much needed professionally trained local interpreters and it is hoped will open up opportunities for employment which are sometimes lacking within the town.

CRU is involved with the forthcoming St Leonards Festival which will take place on 8th July in Warrior Square Gardens, Kings Road and the seafront. There will be performances by local community groups: Kings Road will be closed and given over to stalls and street art; there will be a heliosphere sponsored by the CRU, plus much more... Community groups based in St Leonards are invited to bring along information about their organisations.

The small grants scheme, which Community Regeneration Unit helps administer, has come to an end. The funding stream awarded the last grants in February 2006, so well done to those who were successful. We are waiting to hear what type of funding may be available for this financial year – look on our website for further information.

Southwater

The Community Centre has seen an upsurge in business since taking on No 2 Stainsby Street, which used to be home to the Neighbourhood Renewal Unit. All offices are rented out and the Centre has its administrative support based there.

The Centre itself is busy and has seen changes to use. As well as regular bookings from groups such as Club 4 Kids, Kings Church and 1066 Healers, the Centre has developed a programme of activities itself.

There is a thriving Gardening Group which meets once a month and has regular plant sales and visits to local gardens.

A Reading Group has also developed from ideas brought to the Centre by the local community. Story telling in the Centre also takes place once

a month where volunteers read stories, organise activities and invite the children and their parents to join a relaxation session.

The Centre supports local services for the community, including the fruit and veg stall every Wednesday and the Credit Union every Thursday.

The Centre is currently looking to recruit members of the local community to the committee, which meets once a month to steer the Centre. The Centre also now has a really enthusiastic group of volunteers who are involved in all aspects of the Centre and there is always scope for more volunteer involvement.
