The Trust's mission is to create active cross-sector partnerships to work together for the economic, environmental and social regeneration of Hastings. The Trust's current dynamic state is doing just this with unprecedented vigour, engaging in a wide but connected range of new initiatives to improve life in the Borough. These cover youth, employment, energy, housing, construction, training, the arts and community development.

More staff have been taken on (see pages 3 and 5) and will be taken on, with the Trust HQ bursting at the seams. The Trust has attracted substantial funding of £4.25 million from The Department for Children, Schools and Families (DCSF) for the Myplace youth hub project (see below) and smaller sums which have enabled innovative Third Sector partnership working from Hastings Borough Council's Area Based Grants programme and Community Partnerships Fund. Thanks also to support from the Esmée Fairbairn Foundation we have been able to sustain an expanded management team which has broadened the skills and expertise and enabled us to explore more exciting ventures.

Equally important, and a central concern of the Executive Director Mel Bonney-Kane, is ensuring that projects the Trust sets up and manages have life after funding and that the Trust itself has a more sustainable funding future. An example of how we are trying to do this is that the Trust has attracted funding from the Development Trusts Association's 'Cultivating Enterprise' programme to work up a business plan for an ethical letting agency. If feasible, the proposed enterprise would acquire property on behalf of private investors, upgrade the property using our 'eco-retrofit'

model, and then manage the letting of the completed units, protecting the investment, and providing high quality, energy efficient, affordable to run, private rented accommodation. Alongside this the Trust would seek to provide access to appropriate support for more vulnerable tenants through our effective partnership working including the Hastings Advice Services Partnership.

Why is the Trust doing so well in challenging times? There is a recognition that the Trust's flexibility and holistic approach can arrive at solutions that larger more compartmentalised organisations cannot manage. The members of the Trust team can draw connections between each others' projects and the projects of partners. Take, for example, the forthcoming supported work placements, the existing Energise Hastings (in partnership with SEEDA, Hastings Borough Council, RDP Architects and interested individuals) and Myplace. The terraced house that the Trust owns in Cambridge Gardens as part of its Skills2Build scheme will link these projects and become both an example of how the existing housing stock can be made more energy efficient while respecting architectural style, will train local people in traditional building skills and will help tackle fuel poverty, skills shortages and unemployment.



Myplace

Myplace too has multiple benefits: it is not just about youth provision but job opportunities, enterprise development and preparing young people for adulthood and integration with their community. There were misleading press reports which created unnecessary controversy about the future of St Mary-in-the-Castle, the fine listed 1828 church set in its own crescent on the Hastings sea front. The youth hub will not threaten the church's architectural integrity, indeed it will reveal



features that have been hidden, but it will teach young local people to respect and help preserve their own historic inheritance. This beautiful building has faced the continual problem of finding a local use that can generate funds to maintain it into the future. This is challenge that, with expert help and guidance, the younger generation will now take on.

Here is an excerpt from the Trust's description of the Myplace project to the Borough Council:

The overall vision is for a multi functional arts, music and cultural based provision led by the needs and views of young people, providing opportunities for young people to explore new aspirations through world class facilities, innovative activities, intergeneration and inter cultural contact / working, alongside access to high quality specialist support services.

The project will provide a Centre of Excellence in arts and culture whilst acting as a 'hub' with colocated specialist services, open access youth space, and activities / opportunities for young people and for the wider community.

The project will provide four key elements, identified as priorities by young people consulted:

- live performance space to give young people a unique insight into and involvement in culture and creativity including facilities management, technical support,
- music, studios, live arts, digital media, enterprise space, including a live performance venue, all open to the general public (which will provide experience in all aspects of facilities management) and a working café / snack bar with associated training opportunities
- office, one-to-one, workshop, meeting, training space for agencies working with young people
- open access leisure space with easy access to advice, information and support, etc

Specialist services will be provided by Youth Development Services, alongside other statutory and voluntary providers.

A consultation (pictures this page and cover) took place on 27th of May at St Mary-in-the-Castle

organised by the Trust to involve young people in helping to create the proposed Youth Hub and in selecting the project's architect (downloadable report available soon from www.hastingstrust.com)

Innovative Finance

I have broken this down into four areas, three of which cover the three types of loans we offer. The last area being what I hope to develop in the future.

Growth Fund Loan

Demand is still high for this product, since the first loan was agreed in February 2007.

Appointments are held on Monday and Tuesday, with a drop in service available on a Monday morning.

Details of applications and amounts received and agreed are as follows:-

There has been a drastic reduction of loans agreed. This is mainly due to the quality of the applications and our increasing the processing procedure.

Bearing in mind the type of clients the current arrears as at 29th May 2009 are within manageable limits.

We have built up a good working relationship with the Citizen Advice Bureau, by referring suitable applicants for debt management advice. This is helped by having a representative from the Bureau in each Monday.

The Growth Fund I Contract ended on 31st March 2008. The book and remaining funds then came under control of Innovative Finance.

Innovative Finance Social Enterprise Loan

Of the three loans that were agreed, they have all been fully repaid, except one, which has been written off.

Return to Work Loan

This loan was introduced in September 08 as a result of a number of applications being received through the DWP scheme with requests for assistance in returning to work.

The Loan is aimed at those who want to return to paid employment, and can be used for course costs, licence fees, tools and equipment. As with all loans the main criteria for agreeing will be the ability to repay. Interest is charged at 12.5% with a flat £20 administration fee.

It has been supported by the Job Centre team at Heron House and they are providing us with referrals.

We have received 12 applications and agreed 7 for the amount of £7,151.85.

Three have already been fully repaid and the remaining are reducing in line with the loan agreements

Courses

Three Money Advice courses on behalf of the Fellowship of St Nicholas have been run. This is to provide advice on financial matters to the financially excluded and had 7 attendees. Further courses are planned

Resource Centre

The Resource Centre had 7156 visits from April 2008 to May 2009 compared to 5922 visits in the same period in 07-08.

The attractions were new computers; the contact points for Hastings Credit Union and the Trust's Innovative Finance offering Return to Work Loans and Personal Loans (see page 3); the jobcentre+ outreach service for people on health related benefits; the Trust's info/advice service on learning, looking for work and volunteering; the redecorated space and displays of paintings and photographs by local artists and students; the still super cheap broadband access (2p a minute); the high quality low cost digital colour printing; and, not least, the friendly help from the staff and the excellent volunteers.

Heather Smith, Training and Development Coordinator, was kept busy ensuring the well-being of the volunteers. Volunteers also participated in 'It's never too late' UKonline week aimed at introducing older people to the computers and the internet. And, of course, the volunteers continued to give their indispensable help and skills to the running of the Centre. Heather and Lynne Alison helped those using the Centre for work-place experience. Heather was in constant demand for producing CVs, which she used as a tool to allow clients to understand their own achievements throughout their life.

OASIS

May 2008 saw the start of a series of health information sessions and physical exercise activities here at Oasis. We were joined by health professionals speaking on footcare, diabetes, bowel and urinary problems. Activities included ten pin bowling, chair exercises and walks around Alexandra Park. Outings last summer included an over 50's trip to Leonardslee Gardens and a couple of country lunches. Oasis supports Broomgrove Playscheme and they had an enjoyable summer visiting Southend, Legoland, London Zoo, Tower of London and Dickens World at Chatham.

Oasis now successfully facilitates the Fruit and veg stall, and with the lovely abundance of fresh produce delivered to us twice a week, we can help make it easier for local people to purchase locally grown products within walking distance to their home.

We now have four classes of ESOL (English for Speakers of Other Languages) lessons at Oasis, each week ranging from entry level one, once a week to entry level 2/3 three times per week. There is a crèche provided to support the classes and students are encouraged to join other activities that Oasis provides.

Oasis Befriending Scheme

The Oasis Befriending Scheme is run by the Oasis (Ore Advice Information Support Service) and managed by the Hastings Trust. The scheme supports residents of Ore Valley and is based within this area in Malvern Way. The scheme exists to support, in a friendly, professional and non-demanding manner, people who are isolated or are experiencing feelings of loneliness through providing home visits, phone calls, outings and assistance to attend activities and appointments; as well as friendship. The scheme can also help with understanding and filling forms, provide information on events and activities, and signpost to other agencies for other forms of support you might need. Most of the times its about being able to help especially with those little things that are easily taken for granted, such as uncapping a bottle of bleach, changing light bulbs, correcting time on clocks, knowing where to go when you need assistance, hanging curtains, a friendly chat and such like. It may not seem much to some, but it means a lot to those that need it. To truly provide support that is needed at the time it is needed, the
